Jeanna Som, Executive Director of the Summer Program for Youth (SPY) in Carlisle, PA, provided an informative presentation about the program. SPY is an 8-week summer enrichment program that runs 5 days a week with the same children all summer focusing on Reading, Writing, Math, and providing unique field trip opportunities while instilling a positive mindset to the at-risk youth. Our club provides some financial assistance to them every year. Plus, these are the families that we invite to our annual Children's Christmas Party.

These campers are rising 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> graders selected by their schools as someone who would benefit from the program. Since the program focuses on math and reading skills for the entire summer, instead of regressing over the summer like most of their peers, they use the summer to improve their skills and catch up to their peers.

In addition to working on their academic skills, they receive a daily breakfast, lunch and snack, play games, and go on field trips. This

program depends heavily on volunteers, and everyone is invited to go online at <u>www.timetosignup.com/spy2019</u> to volunteer to help. Volunteers are needed in the kitchen to assist the professional chef to prep, serve, or cleanup a meal or to read a book to the campers. The "Cultures Around the World" theme will rotate countries weekly: June 17<sup>th</sup> Italy, June 24<sup>th</sup> Mexico, July 1<sup>st</sup> USA, July 8<sup>th</sup> China, July 15<sup>th</sup> Nigeria/Africa, July 22<sup>nd</sup> Australia, and the last week of camp could be any of the countries. The time commitment is only 1-2 hours per shift and individual shifts are available all summer, so please help if you have time. ## **SPY Volunteer Information**

Hello.

Once again there are many ways that you can serve as a volunteer at camp.

1. There are **3 different lunch positions and times**. Lunch prep 10-11:30, Lunch serve 11:15-12:30 and Lunch cleanup 12:30 -1:30. You can sign up for the entire time or one or two of the slots. Any help will be needed.

2. There are some days when **lunches need to be packed** and that is an early morning job for 3 people.

3. We also need **readers** to read at least 2 books to a group of kids from 11:30-12:00 and then again from 12:00-12:30. This year the theme for camp is learning about different cultures around the world, and I am going to have books available to choose from for each week's country. The first day of camp is June 12th and there is no specific country for that week so you could read whatever you choose, but there will be a book or two available if you need one.

The other weeks are: June 17th Italy, June 24th Mexico, July 1st USA, July 8th China, July 15th Nigeria/Africa, July 22nd Australia, and the last week of camp could be any of the countries.

Reminder that this requires going downstairs to read to the kids.
